### SCHOOL TO CAREER

Students in School to Career will develop work experience and related skills through direct employment. Students may enroll in the School to Career course during their senior year. Students wishing to participate in School to Career must register for the class, have service hours up-to-date, and be employed prior to registration. Students can be excused from school for work release however it works into their schedule.

The program is entirely online and students will be expected to participate in course work:

- Weekly journal submissions
- Monthly hour log submissions

Students are expected to be passing all classes; not passing classes may result in the loss of work release privileges

## CAPP & AP COURSES CAPP AP

- Courses taken at the high school using UW Oshkosh curriculum
- Students will receive a transcript from UW Oshkosh with a grade for each CAPP course taken that can be sent off to colleges when they apply
- There is a FEE for all CAPP courses in order to receive credit
- No test required to determine credit eligibility (like AP)
- **STUDENTS** are responsible for checking transferability of courses to institutions they plan to apply to

**Step 1: Apply** (complete by July 31 for Fall, Dec. 20 for Spring. Optional workshop offered at HHS in May to complete this step)

**Step 2: Register** (done in class with their teacher)

Students should check email often for next steps from UW
Oshkosh

- Students can take an optional test in May to try to receive college credit
- ■There is not a fee to take the class, but there is a fee to take the AP test
- **STUDENTS** are responsible for checking transferability of courses to institutions they plan to apply to

## START COLLEGE NOW & EARLY COLLEGE CREDIT PROGRAM

- The deadline to submit applications for either program are as follows:
  - March 1 for fall courses
  - October 1 for spring courses
  - \* No late applications will be accepted!
  - \*\* Applications must be filled out for EACH SEMESTER that students plan to take classes

\*Students can ONLY take classes that are listed in the course guide!

To view courses for **ECCP (UW System),** visit the college's website and do a course search UW Oshkosh/UW Fox Cities: <u>TitanWeb - Registrar's Office University of Wisconsin Oshkosh (uwosh.edu)</u>

\*\*STUDENTS are responsible for choosing courses that align with their major/program, as well as making sure credits will transfer to their college of choice

### TRANSFERING CREDITS

- Whether students are planning on taking:
  - Transcripted courses at the high school
  - CAPP courses
  - AP courses
  - Start College Now or Early College Credit Program courses

**Students** are responsible for checking the transferability of those courses!

How do I check to see if the courses I plan to take will transfer to the college/university I plan to attend?

- Call the college's Admissions Office or Registrar's Office directly (\*recommended)
- Transferology.com

### ACT TESTING

ACT Test Date: March 12, 2024

If students wish to retake their ACT to attempt a better score, they must register on their own through ACT.org, and test at a local testing center. The ACT will not be given at HHS for retakes. Students can access their ACT scores online at ACT.org.

\*\*\*Students do NOT need to take the SAT and ACT. Colleges will accept one or the other!

### **Benefits to taking the ACT**:

- Scholarship and financial aid opportunities
- Some employers look at scores before hiring
- Colleges may require it for admission in the future
  - Accepted at *all* U.S. colleges/universities
- Includes a profile and education/career planning section to help students plan for life after high school

### IS YOUR STUDENT STILL UNDECIDED ON A CAREER PATHWAY?

Xello is an online program that offers career exploration and planning tools to help students narrow down their career pathways based on their skills and interests to make informed decisions about their future.

Xello is also how students will request their transcripts to be sent to colleges!

### HOW CAN MY STUDENT ACCESS THIS PROGRAM?

Students will have active profiles/access to Xello until they graduate (go to xello.world to sign in)

USERNAME: HORT-student ID# (\*Must include the dash)

PASSWORD: Students created their own password. If they don't

remember their passwords, they can be reset by their counselor.
