The **DOPS** (Direct Object Prounouns) **Spanish** are:

you (formal, masc.) = her, it (feminine) you (formal, fem.)	you all (masc.) = them, you all (fem.)

Spanish direct object pronouns are placed:

right in front of the conjugated verb

Yo como la manzana. → Yo la como.

Yo veo a mis amigos. → Yo los veo.
