- _____ 12. After he came to power, Hitler tolerated those who opposed him.

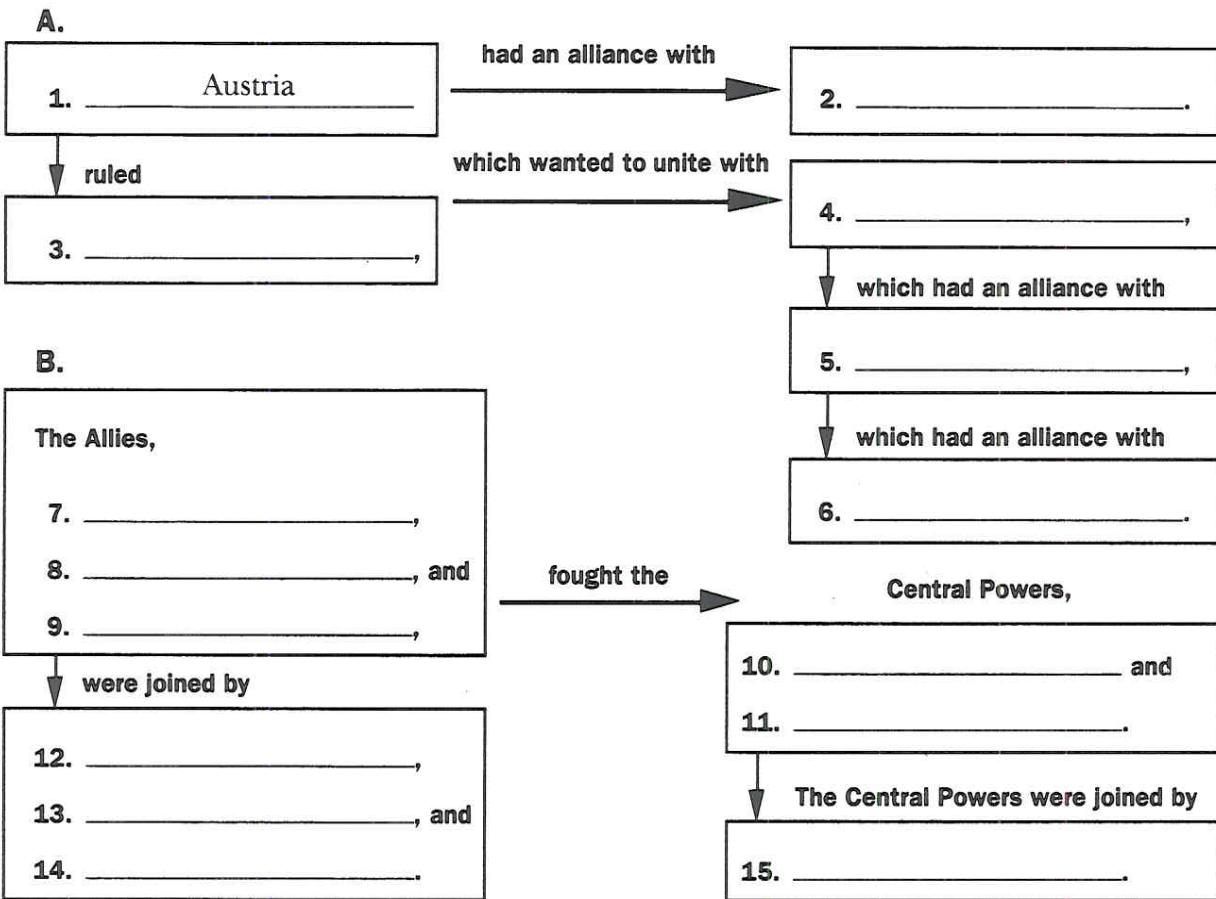
