

# Los Pronombres Sujetos (Subject Pronouns)

**What is a “subject”?** Is the person doing the action in the sentence.

**What is a “pronoun”?** A word used in place of one or more nouns. It can **ONLY** be used to refer to someone that has already been mentioned.

talking “about”	1 <sup>st</sup> person	yo	I	nosotros nosotras	we (masculine) we (feminine)
	talking to	2 <sup>nd</sup> person	you (informal, familiar)	<b>vosotros</b> <b>vosotras</b>	you (M, informal) you (F, informal)
usted (Ud.)				you (formal)	ustedes (Uds.)
talking “about”	3 <sup>rd</sup> person	él ella	he she	ellos ellas	they (masculine) they (feminine)

**ONLY GIRLS CLUB** → Nosotrasas, vosotrasas, & ellas

Once there is a boy in the group, nosotrosos, vosotrosos & ellosos must be used.

A person who is talking **about** another person or themselves who may or may not be in the same room.

**Yo, él, ella,  
nosotros,  
ellas, ellos**

People you are facing and talking to.

**usted & ustedes**

Is formal and is used to **show respect** and/or address people you **DON'T** know well.

- Elders
- People w/titles

The 4 Spanish subject pronouns “you” contain a “U” or a pointy “U (V)” in the subject pronoun.

**Vosotros,-as** is only used in Spain.

People you are facing and talking to.

**tú & vosotros**

Is informal and is used to address people you know well.

- Family
- Friends, peers
- People or children younger than you
