
LETTERS TO THE EDITOR







The Oldest Cabin; A Special Place to the Community and the World By Josh Wilkins

ASHLAND WI-Recently there has been a purchase of a small shack on a fine piece of land of a small river that leads into a huge lake. The most special thing about this fully functionally cabin is that is the oldest cabin in the world, but to understand its full glory you need to know a few bits of history about this marvelous place. The cabin is about 700 sq. feet and was built in 1846.

<u>History</u>

Originally this cabin was built by Joseph Vandertum for a hunting lodge. Vandertum was one of the first settlers to the area. Later he transformed his cabin into his main house. He then wrote to his family to settle in this area which ended up founding the town of Ashland.

With the cabin being 167 years old, it has gone through many owners and multiple refurnishing projects. The first main project was a rebuild of the foundation. To do this the owner of the cabin in 1902, Tim McNellis, had to move the cabin three miles south. When moving the cabin south McNellis moved to cabin from the banks of Lake Superior to a small river that McNellis named after his wife Betty.

Forty years later, in 1942 the cabin was owned by the government for park rangers who had to work at the McNellis Vandertum State Park. When the government purchased to property they established electricity and refurnished the inside of the cabin. Lastly they established a dam which created Lake Thomas. The banks of Lake Thomas are 500 feet away from the front door.

After that not much was done with the cabin, in fact it was abandoned after the start of the Korean War. It was rediscovered in 1992 when locals reported strange smoke signals coming from the woods near Lake Thomas. Local authorities found a group of hippies that were living in the cabin since 1979. The hippies were taken to jail for breaking and entering and being creepy.

Future Plans

Mayor of Ashland Henry Hutchinson states, "The oldest cabin is special place to the community and the world. Regarding Lake Thomas, we always went as children to play and have a great time. Every child in the community knew about the cabin, but no one knew about its history. It is very pleasing to see the cabin being turned into a national monument."

The owners of the cabin tell reports that they will miss playing at the lake and sleepovers in the cabin. "We enjoyed all the time we had at the cabin and we look forward to enjoying visiting the monument to learn about the people who built the cabin that my family and I spent a large amount of time at," explains Phil Weston, the owner of the cabin.

The cabin needs multiple renovations to be safe to the public. Tim Berkley says "We have our hands full for this [project]. First we have to see what pieces that are original and we can still use. Next remodel and furbish and before you know it we have created and brought back history."

Mayor Hutchinson also explains, "This cabin will promote enthusiasm of Ashland's history. It also will promote another reason for more tourism. This will boost local business leaving an overall positive impact on the community."

Disagreement?

Although many agree that the cabin is a good idea a handful of local disagree with the making of a national monument. Molly Sanderson says, "With the building and added tourists, Lake Thomas will be more polluted and our local traditions will be changed. The cabin has been around for all to go into and now we have the need to make money on the cabin many knew about just now."

As of right now the plans to make the cabin a national monument are still going on. If all goes according to plan the monument will be ready for the summer of 2014.
